What has been happening this term?

Crime and Punishment Workshop

Students at Birch Wood College have been learning about Crime and Punishment as part of their Personal Development lessons. Students at BWCN attended a full-day workshop across two historic sites. The session started at Rutland County Museum (including the only surviving New Drop Gallows in the United Kingdom!) to examine historical punishments and how the penal system has changed. The focus was specific local Rutland cases and characters from the 1700s and 1800s. Following this, at Oakham Castle, students gained practical experience in a courtroom setting by participating in a mock trial. The students were exemplary, and their high level of engagement demonstrated their enthusiasm for learning.



DofE Expedition

Post-16 students participating in the DofE programme this year successfully passed and completed their Bronze award. As part of their final assessment, students had to complete a two day and overnight expedition. The expedition involved completing an 11 km navigation walk, utilizing their survival and camp craft skills, mastering route planning techniques, and understanding emergency procedures. Travel Training

Being able to travel on public transport is a crucial life skill. Post-16 students have been taking part in travel training in the Melton area to become safe and independent travellers. The students have covered: - Building confidence in using buses - Personal safety - How to use timetables and buy tickets - Road safety, including coping with traffic on major roads - What to do when things go wrong (e.g., the bus is late). Students have made fantastic efforts to gain confidence and skills to travel independently.

The club provides a fun and exciting way for students to learn a wide range of Makaton sign language through songs, modelling, and conversation. 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




Prom

The young students enjoyed a magical evening at the prom, creating unforgettable memories as they laughed, danced, and celebrated with their closest friends.










Residential:
